Overview

The government will continue to manage the risk of serious illness from the spread of the virus. Step 4 marked a new phase in the government's response to the pandemic, moving away from stringent restrictions on everyone's day-to-day lives, towards advising people on how to protect themselves and others, alongside targeted interventions to reduce risk.

The government guidance is more aligned across settings (businesses, office workers, education, out of school settings & performing arts). We still need to consider the risk but are following the principles laid out in all the updated government documents.

Following the end of the Plan B restrictions, we are continuing to take a cautious approach to the virus as laid out in the risk assessment below.

Additional information/guidance is included based on the Music Mark advice with regards to bespoke teaching situations or instruments.

Key elements are:

- Adequate ventilation
- Cleaning
- Mask-wearing

APPENDIX A

Self-Isolation Government guidance

The self-isolation advice for people with coronavirus (COVID-19) has changed. It is now possible to end self-isolation after 5 full days if you have 2 negative LFD tests taken on consecutive days. The first LFD test should not be taken before the fifth day after your symptoms started (or the day your test was taken if you did not have symptoms). The self-isolation period remains 10 full days for those without negative results from 2 LFD tests taken a day apart.

You do not need to take a PCR test if you have already taken an LFD test and the result was positive.

If you live in the same household as someone with COVID-19 you are at significantly higher risk of becoming infected yourself.

If you have been vaccinated with a COVID-19 vaccine, you are less likely to become severely ill if you catch COVID-19. You are also less likely to spread COVID-19 to other people, but it is still possible for this to happen. Therefore:

if you are aged 18 years, 6 months or over and you are not fully vaccinated*, and you live in the same household as someone with COVID-19, you are legally required to stay at home and self-isolate. if you are fully vaccinated or aged under 18 years and 6 months, and you live in the same household as someone with COVID-19, you are not legally required to self-isolate. However, you are strongly advised to take an LFD test every day for 7 days, and to self-isolate if any of these test results is positive.

*You are fully vaccinated 14 days after having received 2 doses of an approved vaccine (such as Pfizer/BioNTech, AstraZeneca or Moderna/Spikevax) or one dose of the single-dose Janssen vaccine.

All teaching staff should revert to teaching online if they have to self-isolate and rearrange their teaching accordingly.

APPENDIX B

Teaching specific guidelines – all teachers should continue to follow school risk assessments, government guidelines as well as the following revised BM guidelines.

SCHOOL TEACHING

- 1. Do not attend school if you suspect that you may be coming down with Coronavirus symptoms: follow self-isolation procedures if they apply to you.
- 2. Ask for the school's risk assessments for COVID-19; ask about anything you do not understand and abide by the control measures specified i.e. toilet or break provision.
- 3. Find out what the school's infection control procedures are; follow them and make use of anything the school is good enough to provide for your safety.
- 4. If you think that a child may be showing symptoms of Coronavirus, stop the lesson and report your concerns to the school immediately.
- 5. Wind and brass instruments should continue <u>not</u> to be shared, all other instruments can be shared for projects but will need wiping down between classes. Never play on a pupil's mouthpiece or allow them to play on yours.
- 6. Teaching rooms **must** have a window that can open or a ventilation system that brings in fresh air. Teachers are to use their discretion as to how many students it is appropriate to teach in the room size they are using at schools. If groups remain unviable due to the size of them room, you may teach every other week as directed last year.
- 7. We do not expect cleaning to take place in between lessons but we expect staff and students to adhere to regular hand hygiene as this is the most effective way of managing the transmission. Cleaning materials will be provided if you wish to wipe down any shared items.
- 8. We strongly advise teachers to continue to use face coverings whilst working in schools.
- 9. Rooms need to be ventilated at all times and should be aired quickly between lessons where possible.
- 10. Teachers will need to continue to take twice-weekly lateral flow tests until at least the end of the Spring Term.

MUSIC CENTRES

- 1. Do not attend music centre if you suspect that you may be coming down with Coronavirus symptoms: follow self-isolation procedures if they apply to you.
- 2. If you think that a child may be showing symptoms of Coronavirus, stop the activity and report your concerns to the receptionist immediately.
- 3. Ensembles can resume indoors as long as the space is large enough and can be well ventilated/ventilated in between rehearsals.
- 4. There will no longer be any maximum person numbers on rooms, MCDM's will use their discretion as to whether a room is an appropriate size and well ventilated.
- 5. We do not expect cleaning to take place in between lessons and ensembles but we expect staff and students to adhere to regular hand hygiene as this is the most effective way of managing the transmission. Cleaning materials will be provided if you wish to wipe down any shared items.
- 6. Conductors should still keep their distance and conduct from behind a clear pull up screen if they wish.
- 7. We strongly advise teachers to continue to use face coverings whilst working in music centres.
- 8. Rooms need to be ventilated and should be aired quickly between lessons where possible.
- 9. Teachers will need to continue to take twice-weekly lateral flow tests until at least the end of the Spring.
- 10. Any visitors to music centres should continue to check in using the QR code to support the NHS track & trace system but will no longer need to be temperature checked.
- 11. Parents are allowed on site but should be encouraged not to congregate in corridors or other enclosed spaces.
- 12. The printing and handing out of music should still be minimised and students encouraged to print their own where possible.
- 13. Students will be able to make use of BM music stands.
